FAQs

Q: "I checked my grade and it said that I received a D in the class. Is this correct?"

- i) Learn algebra. ('Algebra' here includes exponents, logarithms, and the ability to graph linear and quadratic functions.)
- ii) Ask yourself, about each concept, "Do I understand this?" and "Can I use this idea (without looking at practice examples at the same time)?" Answer honestly. If you answer 'No', then continue working and studying until you can answer "Yes".
- iii) Spend two hours per day, five days a week seriously doing homework. Invent your own if the professor did not give enough, or find HW on the innumerable on-line sources. Spend at least one of these two hours WITHOUT consulting the web for answers to any questions.
